FROM THE RECTOR



The Return of the Common Cup (adapted from last week)

For the past few years we have been living with a sense of emergency. Covid shook us all up, forcing us to configure our community life quite differently. This has included some frustrating and complicated inhibitions to our worshipping life, including gathering, singing and Holy Communion (or the Eucharist).

Due to the uncertainty about the spread of covid, we eventually settled on the use of small communion cups. It is a problematic practice, creating additional demands on the volunteers who have to wash and prepare the cups for each service. More importantly, it is an affront to Anglican eucharistic theology, which has always emphasised the common cup as an important symbol of unity.

Circumstances forced us to compromise this symbolic value, in order to emphasise another point of principle – the significance of receiving communion 'in both kinds' – i.e. both bread and wine. When I initiated this change, I explained that this was an emergency measure. As such, when the emergency passed, so too would this distinctly un-Anglican practice.

That time has come. Last year, churches received permission from Bishop Mark to return to the common cup. At General Synod last May, the common cup was used at the synod eucharist, comprising over 300 people. The view of our Commonwealth and Territory governments is that the sense of crisis can no longer be maintained, and it is appropriate to leave emergency measures behind.

Today, we shall return to what has been the eucharistic practice of the church for the best part of two millennia. Individual cups have now gone. People who wish are welcome to receive only the bread or to 'intinct' – i.e. dip the bread into a different chalice of wine (although this is less hygienic than the common cup.)

Multiple studies have consistently shown that there has never been an outbreak of infection related to the communion cup, and that any risk is so small as to be undetectable. More significantly, the shared cup is a precious sign of the fellowship we have with each other when, as the family of God, we gather at his table.

May the blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for you, preserve your body and soul to everlasting life; drink this in remembrance that Christ's blood was shared for you, and be thankful.

A SECOND CHANCE IN LIFE

When we were delivering Christmas hampers last year, I met a new client who wanted to know what services St John's Care (SJC) offers to the community.

This client who we are going to call P told me he will be back soon because he really needs help making improvements in his life.

P came looking for me yesterday and started to summarise many memorable experiences both good and bad. He told me that his life had been full of excuses and some bad decisions which were now affecting his health.

P explained how he was married and, after reflecting, told me that he was never a good husband or a good father. In fact, he was blinded by excuses for so long that he lost his family.

After losing his family he suffered two strokes and now has difficulty getting around. He takes medication daily, making work near impossible.

P said that this year he has started to share custody of his three children (every other week). P explained that he is trying to do the best he can to improve life for himself and his children. He is trying to lead a much healthier life knowing that his children are still young and need him by their side.

P and I had a conversation about how St John's Care could help him. One of the goals we identified was to improve his standard of living and that of his children.

As he takes a lot of medicine, he suggested that it would be great if SJC could help him with his scripts. I agreed to help him with the scripts once a month, and also agreed to provide him with food, especially school snacks, on the weeks when he has his children.

We also talked about how to prepare healthy meals. I printed out some helpful information as well as some ideas about using the food which SJC provides.

P was super happy and told me that by receiving this help, he would be able to pay his rent and utility bills. One of his main concerns was the expense of grocery shopping when caring for his children.

With the money he receives from Centrelink, he cannot afford to cover his expenses. Getting help from St John's Care means he doesn't have to worry too much about how to stretch his income. Receiving help with food and healthy eating ideas will assist in improving his everyday life.

He was very grateful and a smile appeared on his face. "Now I will try to be the person and the father that my children deserve and thanks to all of you I will achieve it", he said before saying goodbye.

I would like to thank the donors, supporters and volunteers who have contributed to our organisation, and who have played a part in supporting people like P.

UPDATE FROM PARISH COUNCIL

Report from the Meeting of Parish Council of 15 March

The final planning for the Queen's Tree planting event was discussed, as was the organisation of the Schoolhouse Museum's Heritage activities, along with a gunfire breakfast at the parish on ANZAC Day. Council also considered means by which time can be freed up for more detailed discussions at its meetings by moving more routine items to the Executive to handle on its behalf.

The Rector reported on the potential for reintroducing marriage preparation courses in the parish and means by which the approved 2023-2028 Strategic Plan might be implemented in the years ahead. He also reported on challenges he and Canon Kevin Stone face in terms of strengthening Pastoral Care in the parish – notably, the relatively small number of people available to transition to a viable pastoral care team.

Several property and maintenance issues have been identified and solutions to these are currently being worked on. Some of the pavers across the St John's precinct have become uneven and unfortunately as a result a parishioner tripped recently. The uneven pavers will be fixed.

Council was briefed on the arrangements put in place for the Parish Information Day which was held on Saturday 18 March.

Consideration is being given to a proposal that the western side of St John's Care could be used for more car parking and that the emergency evacuation point be relocated to the fountain lawn. It was agreed that the Executive needs to consult with relevant parties and undertake appropriate investigations to determine if there are environmental constraints on the future use of the site immediately to the west of St John's Care prior to any decisions being made.

THE PARISH OPEN DAY

The Parish Open Day last Saturday 3pm to 6pm provided an opportunity for parishioners and our neighbours to meet together and have plenty of discussions over an afternoon Tea and BBQ. The displays in the hall were colourful with plenty of enthusiasm.

Some highlights:

- The parish council session resulted in new nominations for parish council;
- the church session resulted in potential new verger support;
- the mission team showed the ways we provide Christian witness to the community;
- the pastoral care team had some great discussions:

- the bell ringers signed up new members;
- flower posies were created and given away;
- the community Fair stalls had examples of what they sell on Fair day;
- St John's Care gave tours of their building;
- Friends of St John's and the Schoolhouse teams showed how to link to the wider community;
- Parish archives, parking and heritage displays showed what is available;
- the music and sound team provided background music in the hall;
- the jumping castle was popular for the young (and young at heart).
